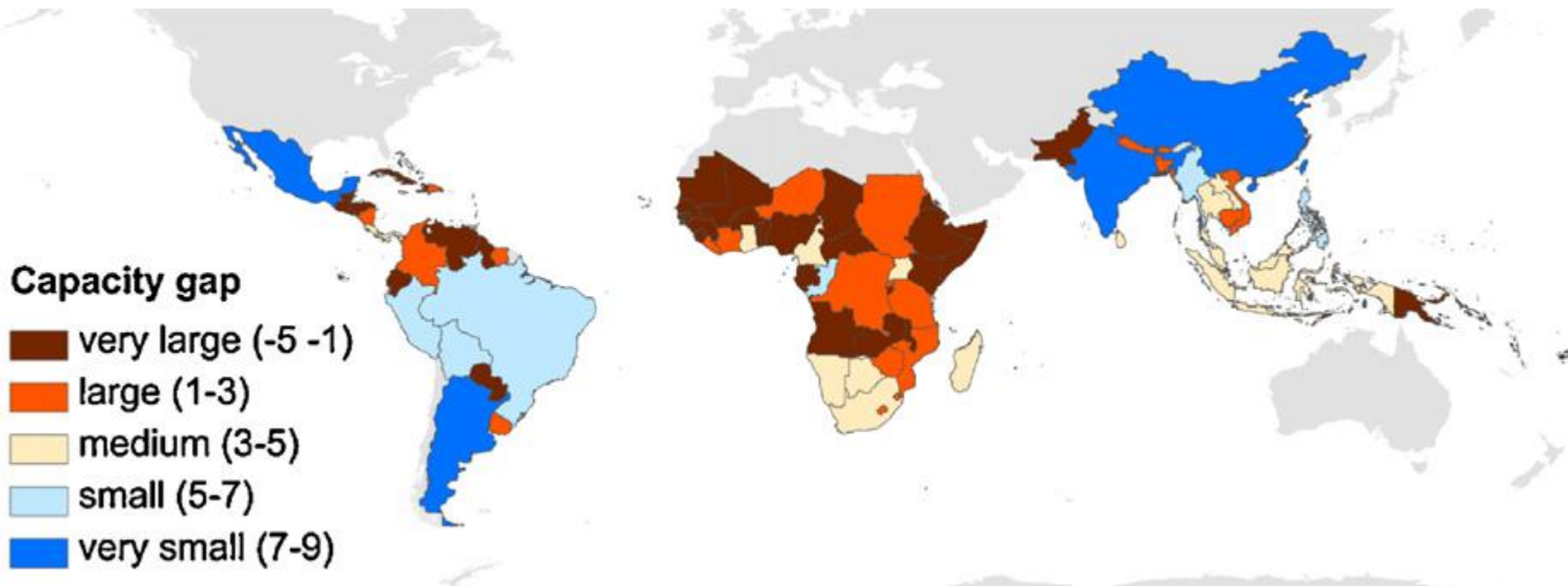

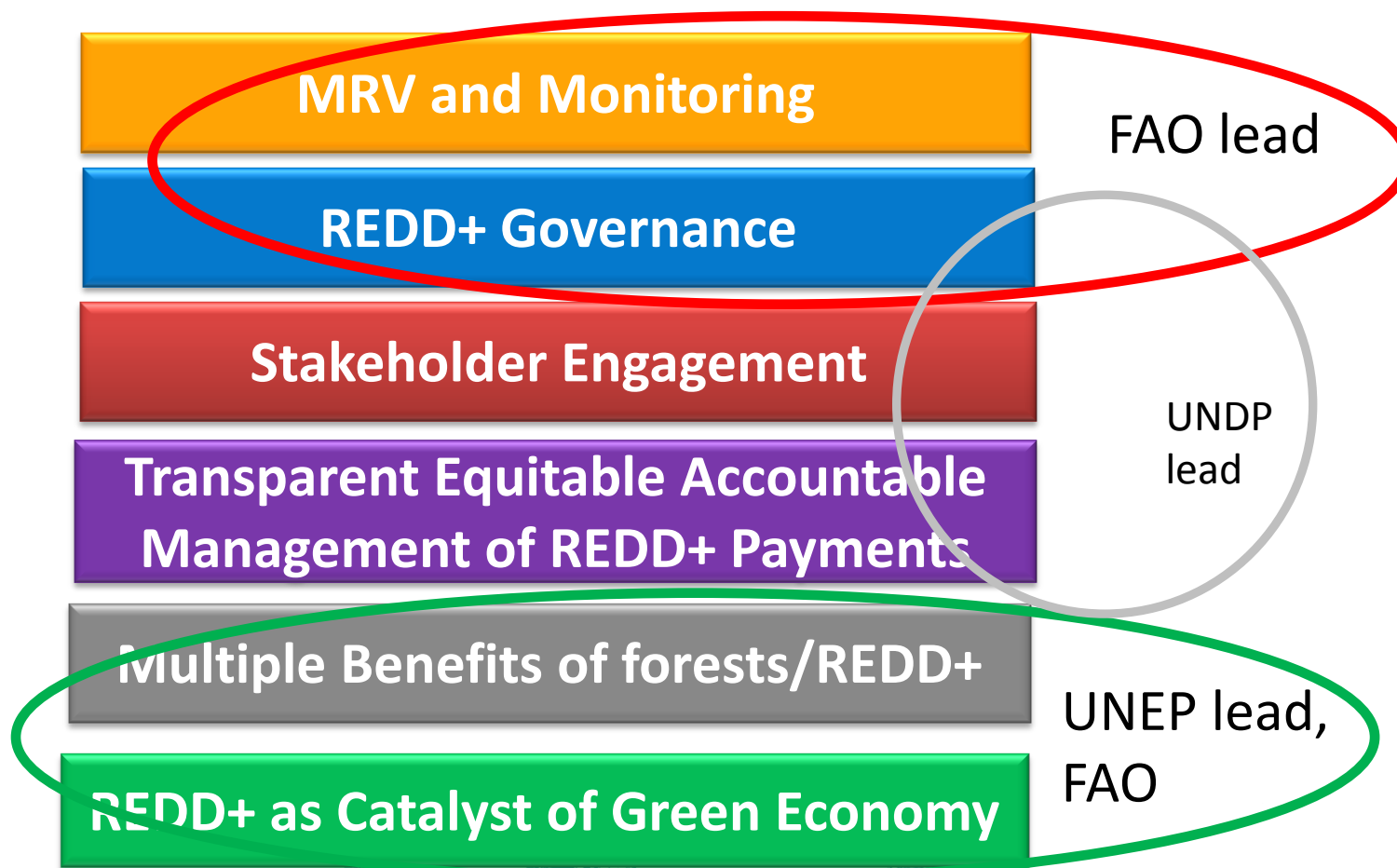


Where are the Capacity gaps for REDD+ in RS?



- Very large capacity gaps in forty nine developing countries (brown), mostly in Africa
- while only four countries had very small capacity gap (blue) – 2 in Asia (India, China)
- Asia large capacity differences – opportunities for within region sharing & learning

REDD+ topics and UN-REDD agency leads



UN-REDD has Two Levels of Support



1. National Support

- Support development and implementation of country-led REDD+ strategies
- Strong focus on country ownership and Indigenous Peoples' & civil society involvement
- Targeted support to countries

2. International Support

- Focus on capacity building, MRV and monitoring, stakeholder engagement, governance and multiple benefits of REDD+
- Building awareness and consensus about the importance of REDD+


Both levels working in close partnership with WB FCPF and For. Investment Program, among other partners



Global and regional programme

Key operating principles

- Global regional training program develop & test approaches, building on National Programmes
- Share experiences and disseminate lessons learned (esp. South-South and regional exchanges)
- Supporting the development and implementation of guidelines, best practices, methods, safeguards, standards and tools
- Ensuring consistency in approaches and economies of scale and efficiency in delivery, working in partnerships with others



UNREDD examples of Global Programme work

- **Measurement, Reporting and Verification (MRV):** Develop and implement MRV: forest inventories, satellite land use change (incl. deforestation / afforestation)
- **Multiple Benefits:** Maps of potential multiple benefits (incl. biodiversity) from REDD+
- **Stakeholder involvement:** Guidelines on Free Prior and Informed Consent (FPIC)
- **Legal preparedness** – support to countries, training workshops and expert consultations (e.g. Land tenure and REDD+ Feb Rome)

Aim/Outcome: REDD + countries have systems and capacities to develop and implement MRV and monitoring

Approach: Global / regional CD program developing MRV methods building on National Programmes, adapted to Country context

- Share experiences and disseminate lessons learned across countries and agencies at regional, global levels (esp. South-South exchanges)

Activities: 3 regional workshops (Latin Am. April, Asia Oct, Africa Dec)

- Prepare training material on GHG, REDD+ and broader SFM needs
- Support national MRV, forest and GHG inventories, building on national examples and sharing experiences and methodologies to improve consistency and efficiency
- 2014 – 3 or 4 follow up workshops as required, with a global synthesis and lessons-learned workshop
