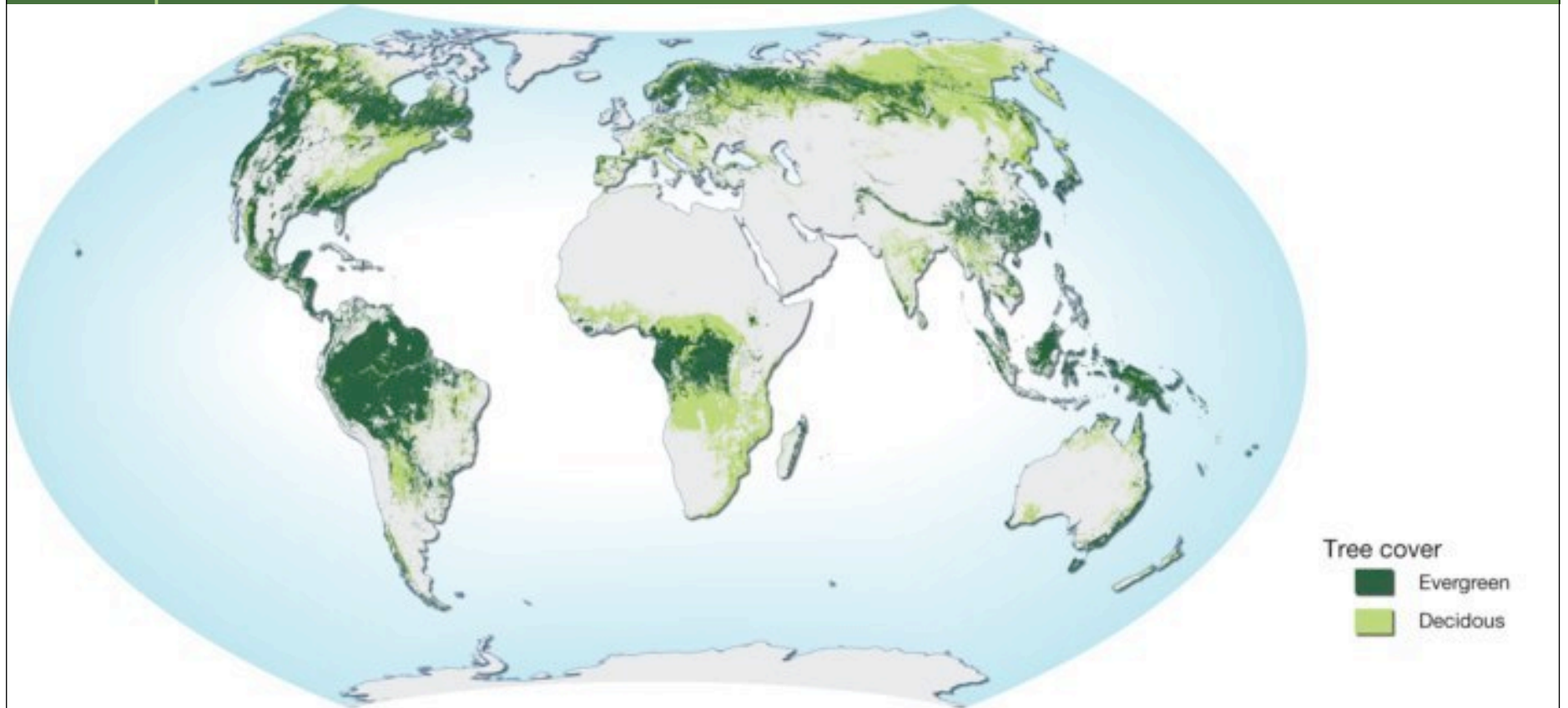

Distribution of Worlds Forests – homes to Indigenous Peoples

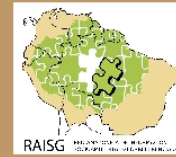
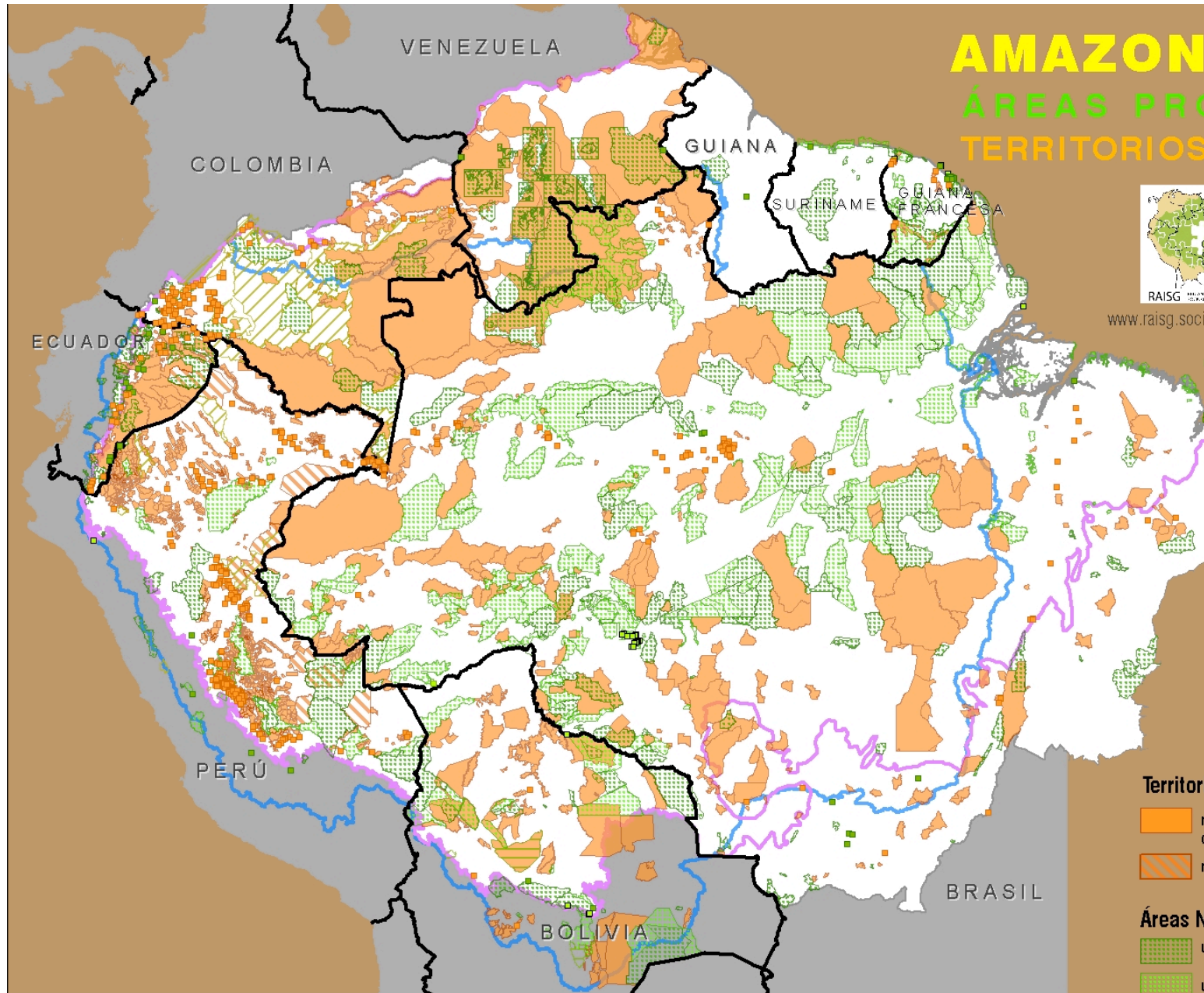

Key Best Practice Themes

1. Equity in benefits, rights, citizen security, informacion
2. Cross-scale governance “fit” connecting local & national
3. Protecting IP production – swidden, timber

Best Practice Principles

1. Respect tenure & production rights
2. Use UNDRIP as guide, FPIC
3. Transparent decision-making & financial flows accountable to Ips
4. Local monitoring for ground truth
5. Build from the local base up

Building IP & REDD Synergies

1. Prioritize IP for significant REDD attention and assistance; maintain regular communication
 - n Offer IP incentives and TA for designing REDD projects/programs
 - n Open doors for designing policy reform in collaboration with IP in REDD strategies
 - n Respect and respond to indigenous concerns at highest levels
 - n Raise general awareness of importance of IP
