Developing an Indicator Set and Data Collection Tools for the Participatory Governance Assessment for REDD+ in Vietnam

Da Lat, Lam Dong 16-17 April 2013

Course objectives:

This two-day training aims to develop an understanding among all participants, who come from different background and levels, on key considerations in the development of a an indicator set for further use in the PGA in Vietnam, and the capacity needed to develop the indicator set and data collection tools, considerations and potential relevant data sources. In more specific terms, by the end of the training participants will:

- have agreed on the necessity in development an indicator set and data collection tools for PGA (for REDD+)
- have developed common understanding on the main elements of and the main step for developing indicators (based on the prioritized issues)
- be aware of key considerations for data collection
- are aware of general considerations when later on deciding on the data collection methodologies relevant for the PGA
- have explored possible data sources, and
- have developed a draft indicator set and data collection tools, building on prioritized governance issues agreed in Da Lat in March 2013

Course outputs:

1. A short training report documenting the program, process, methods, major discussion, feedback from the training and recommendation for the next steps.

2. A draft framework for assessment of forest governance in Lam Dong province, focusing on maximum two priorities as highlighted in the PGA workshop in March 2013, and the related tools for data collection, and
3. Tentative plan for next steps
