Global leaders to release pledges and timeline to end forest loss and billions of tons of carbon emissions at global Climate Summit

NEW YORK – On Tuesday, 23 September 2014, the world's forests will take center stage at the UN Climate Summit 2014 when dozens of global leaders release pledges and a timeline to end forest loss and billions of tons of carbon emissions. Forest loss accounts for up to 17% of global carbon emissions – more than all the autos, trains, planes and ships in the world. To address climate change, it is imperative that forest loss is slowed and eventually ended. Several countries, companies and institutions will announce individual commitments to help reach that goal.

These new pledges mark the first time in history that a critical mass of developed and developing country world leaders has partnered around such a goal. The announcement will include dozens of heads of government, CEOs of some of the world's biggest companies and heads of influential civil society and indigenous peoples organizations.

The new pledges and timeline are intended to change the politics going into next year's global climate talks in Paris, and to accelerate action by companies to eliminate deforestation from their supply chains.

It is also anticipated that multi-million dollar pledges in support of reducing emissions from deforestation and forest degradation in developing countries (REDD+) will be announced by key governments at the UN Climate Summit 2014.
