National REDD+ Strategies

- REDD+ National Strategy, 2012-2030 (Indonesian REDD+ Task Force, June 2012)
- The Philippine National REDD-plus Strategy (PNRPS), 2010-2020 (The Philippines REDD-plus Strategy Team, Spearheaded by Department of Environment and Natural Resources and CoDe REDD-plus Philippines)
- National REDD+ Action Program (NRAP), 2011-2020 (Government of Viet Nam, June 2012)



Indonesia



- Existing national climate change programs are based on a number of laws and regulations pertaining to spatial planning, forestry and environment.
- REDD+ National Strategy Framework with Five Main
 Pillars
 - Accelerated spatial planning
 - Conservation and maintenance of biodiversity
 - Economic growth
- Increasing stakeholders' role in planning



Indonesia







- Reform of spatial planning
 - Strengthening the authority and function of the National Spatial Planning Coordination Board (BKPRN) through revision of Presidential Decision No. 4/2009 on the BKPRN to synchronize data and information in order to plan forestry and other land uses based on judicial, biophysical, ecological, socio-economic, and cultural considerations.
- Mapping and acknowledgement of indigenous peoples' territories and local communities











- THE GOAL of the PNRPS is to take a broad approach among communities, allied agencies, organizations and stakeholder groups in promoting REDD-plus towards the attainment of sustainable forest management, development and poverty reduction.
- The PNRPS seeks strategies that facilitate decentralized governance and local decision-making within broader national REDD-plus planning and of spatial planning and oversight.
- Resolve the issue of permanence by promoting land use planning and stakeholder participation that secure long-term forest resource management and biodiversity conservation.



Philippines







- Promote a watershed/ecosystem/landscape-based approaches towards REDD+ planning,
- Forest Local Use Planning should be mandated at the Local Government Unit (LGU) level prior to the development of local REDD-plus projects.
- REDD-plus will require an ongoing dialogue process, such that consultations, meetings and action planning should be continued indefinitely to ensure the stakeholder engagement that is essential to effective and equitable implementation.



Viet Nam





- The goal of the NRAP is the reduction of greenhousegas emissions through efforts to mitigate deforestation and forest degradation, increased greenhouse-gas sequestration by forests, sustainable management of forest resources, biodiversity conservation, and contribution to the successful implementation the national strategy on climate change and poverty reduction, and striving towards sustainable development.
- The implementation of the NRAP is to associate with the promotion of the green and less-emission agriculture, contribution to sustainable development, national **food security and poverty reduction**.



Viet Nam







- Diversification and improvement of livelihoods of the forest owners and the people at large
- Development of the action plan to implement REDD+ at provincial level and mainstreaming REDD+ into forest protection and development and land-use planning.
- Reviewing and improving land-use planning and forest protection and development plans
- Strengthening communication campaigns, raising awareness, mobilizing the participation of local people, local communities and organizations in the planning, implementation and monitoring of REDD+



Summary







- Little reference to spatial planning (exception Indonesia), more about broader planning approaches in incorporation in existing planning approaches
- Importance of wide stakeholder engagement stressed
- Recognition of multiple social and environmental benefits
- Links to livelihoods, food security and poverty reduction acknowledged
