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N-REDD Workshop objectives achieved

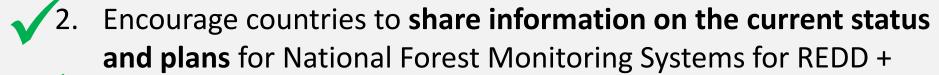








"National Forest Monitoring Systems: Monitoring and Measurement, Reporting and Verification (M & MRV) in the context of REDD + activities".

- 2) Monitoring forests using satellite images
- 3) Collection of other information in NFI's including socio-economic and biodiversity data, consultation and safeguards
