Introduction

A well-planned REDD+ programme will result in biodiversity and ecosystem services being retained or restored. Conversely, without adequate planning or safeguards, heightened risks and reduced benefits could result. These risks and opportunities are addressed in the Cancun safeguards, a critical part of the REDD+ framework that is being negotiated under the UNFCCC. As part of its UN-REDD Programme work, UNEP supports countries in their work on safeguards, the quantification, valuation and mapping of multiple benefits, and monitoring the impacts of REDD+ on ecosystem services and biodiversity.

The objectives of this workshop are to:

1. Share country experiences on planning for multiple benefits and safeguard implementation, and to provide an opportunity for South-South learning.
2. Offer participants the opportunity to learn about the decision-support offered by the UN-REDD Programme.
3. Assist UN-REDD partner countries to address multiple benefits, safeguards, and their inclusion in national REDD+ strategies.
4. Evaluate what further work is needed on these topics to meet national needs within the framework of the UN-REDD Programme.

Three main topics are covered in the three days of the workshop. These are:

- REDD+ safeguards and their application;
- Mapping, quantification and valuation of the risks and opportunities from REDD+ for biodiversity and ecosystem services;
- Monitoring of actual REDD+ impacts.

Interactive break-out groups will address specific issues, such as an introduction to the use of spatial planning software for REDD+. While social issues will be discussed, the primary focus of the workshop will be on environmental risks and benefits.
