#### Minutes of the 6th UN-REDD Programme Executive Board Meeting

Venue: Sofitel Phnom Penh Phokeethra Hotel - Phnom Penh

Date: 12 December2013 Time: 13:45-17:15

#### **Summary of Minutes**

The sixth Cambodia UN-REDD Programme Executive Board (PEB) meeting was organized on the 12<sup>th</sup> of December at the Sofitel Phnom Penh Phokeethra Hotel, Phnom Penh.

Co-chair Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren gave the opening speech. She highlighted the importance of REDD+ in contributing to sustainable development and economic growth, in particular green growth. She also pointed out the achievements made thus far and the challenges ahead. In his opening remarks, H.E. Dr. Chheng Kimsun, Director General of FA, highlighted the seven important decisions adopted at COP19 in Warsaw. He also mentioned the recent study tours to Cambodia by seven countries and the upcoming study tours by three other countries to Cambodia.

#### **Decisions and Actions Required:**

- The PEB decided that the Secretariat should consider sending email alerts prompting different stakeholders of new materials available on the cambodia-redd.org webpage.
- The PEB endorsed the work plan for 2014 provisionally for the first trimester (four months), and requested the NPD to explore additional sources of funding to fill the budget shortfall.
- The PEB decided that at its first meeting in 2014 with an update on spending in the first
  quarter of 2014 and on expectations for the rest of year will be presented. If there are still
  expectations of shortfalls then the Secretariat shall present an options paper for how to deal
  with this.
- The PEB agreed that the coordination mechanism for all REDD+ related initiatives in Cambodia should not be the PEB, but should be government led. Thus, the PEB recommended that the Secretariat prepare an options paper for presentation to the Taskforce to reflect and further decide on the format for such coordination mechanism.
- The PEB agreed that an open Board meeting will be piloted at the 8<sup>th</sup> PEB meeting (second PEB in 2014). In such meeting stakeholders working on REDD+ initiatives in Cambodia are invited to share information on their activities during the first part of the PEB meeting.
- The PEB requested the NPD to lead periodically on technical monitoring of progress based on agreed indicators at PEB Meeting.
- The PEB urged the RTS to ensure that the technical teams should become operational by the end of 2013; and requested a report on progress of the technical teams at the next PEB meeting.
- The PEB requested that creating greater synergies among strategies development under Outcome 2 be reflected in the next quarterly work plan.
- The 7<sup>th</sup> PEB meeting will be held on the 03<sup>rd</sup> April, 2014.

#### Comments and discussion

Mr. Chuop Paris questioned document 1 in relation to the establishment of the technical teams. He suggested that the technical teams should be established as soon as possible to make sure REDD+related activities can proceed. He thus questioned why the technical teams are not yet established. He then questioned document 4 on the means of communications. He suggested that the communication officer should circulate information of the program through email. He pointed to the example of the list serve created by FAO in order to circulate their information.

Mr. Lun Kimhy mentioned that in terms of the establishment of the technical teams, his H.E. Chheng Kimsun had already sent the invitation letters the DGs of the different line ministries. As of now, three ministries have sent technical officers to join the technical teams. In the second Taskforce meeting, it was agreed that the Secretariat should invite the nominated officers to join the meeting and related technical discussions. Later, when other ministries have sent their officers, the officers will start joining the technical teams gradually.

Mr. Peter Iversen stated that he will bring the email alert idea to the communication officer, Ms. Thy Heang (unable to attend the PEB meeting).

H.E. Chheng Kimsun agreed that the email alert idea is a good idea.

Mr. Kim Nong mentioned that MoE had already nominated their technical officers, and so why they are not mentioned in the technical teams.

Mr. Thomas Enters mentioned that may be the nomination from the MoE had been sent, but it has not been received yet. He also asked if FA had already made the nominations. With regards to email and website, the program in Vietnam circulates email alerts once in a while to highlight the posting of new documents on their website. Also, some people like himself have a size limit on incoming emails, and thus an email alert would be better than sending the document. Mr. Enters also asked about the status of the five policy briefs.

Mr. Peter Iversen mentioned that the policy briefs have been produced but they are currently being revised by the authors to fit the format established by the Secretariat. The major part of the work is done.

Mr. Thomas Enters suggested that the drafts are made available for review by various stakeholders such as the Consultation Group. Thus he suggested that the drafts of the policy briefs to be made available on the website and invite public comments and inputs.

Mr. Koen Everaert supported the work on communications and mentioned that it seems that the Facebook page is being used by Cambodian youth. This is a good sign in terms of public awareness on REDD+ in Cambodia. He also encouraged the RTS to use it very actively by posting to the page recent updates on REDD+ and other related sectors.

Ms. Setsuko Yamazaki commended the RTS on the progress made, especially the study tours. These study tours represented a great example of south-south cooperation amongst REDD+ countries; and thus they should be encouraged in the future. She was also pleased with the progress made by the communication team.

**H.E. Chheng Kimsun** mentioned that RTS has received requests from Thailand and Myanmar to come to visit Cambodia. Malaysia had recently visited.

#### Comments and discussion

Mr. Ouk Vibol asked for clarification on the budget and an explanation on each of the four outcomes.

Ms. Pan Thida explained that Outcome 1 covers the operational cost, personnel, administration, travel for capacity building for government partners and RTS members, and meetings such as the PEB, Taskforce, and other stakeholder engagement meetings as well as the photo concert. Outcome 2 covers activities for National Protected Areas management plan, FA's National Forest Program, FiA works, and other technical works in regards to hiring international and national consultants. Outcome 3 is UNDP's budget, and spent according to plan. In short, Outcome 2 needs to be accelerated in terms of decision making, administrative works, and consultant recruitments.

Mr. Thomas Enters mentioned that the figure on Outcome 2 is a bit misleading, for instance safeguards work is being done but there is no cost associated because a group of people have been working on the document that will be presented to the Taskforce in January which does not cost anything. He then mentioned that in getting ready for REDD+, the focus should be more on having the national REDD+ Strategies as a final product rather than focusing too much on moving from one phase to the next. He then mentioned the need for additional capacity building after the UN-REDD Programme will continue with the FCPF coming in. This work should begin as soon as possible.

Mr. Koen Everaert was surprised at the low expense for Outcome 2 because Outcome 2 is also expected to support the National Forestry Programme, which is currently under-funded. He thus suggested that RTS communicate this available funding to the FA because REDD+ is also mentioned in the National Forestry Programme. Also the Protected Areas Management Strategy at GDANCP is underfunded and can be supported by REDD+.

Mr. Ouk Vibol mentioned that FiA is considering including REDD+ program in their next 10 year strategic management plan. He presented this idea at the FiA's last Technical Working Group meeting with positive response from the FiA's Director General.

Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren mentioned that this discussion highlighted the issue of how to use available resources effectively, efficiently and on time.

Priority activities in 2014

by Ms. Pan Thida

#### Comments and discussion

Mr. Ouk Vibol asked when did the programme start.

Ms. Pan Thida mentioned that the programme started in May 2011.

Mr. Ouk Vibol asked if there were consultations amongst the FA, FiA, and GDANCP on the proposed activities mentioned in document 6 and document 9.

Ms. Pan Thida stated that consultations were done at the weekly Secretariat meeting which involved staff from FA. FiA and GDANCP.

Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren invited the PEB members to focus on the detailed work plan under Outcome 2 since it is the Outcome that demonstrated the most severe bottleneck in 2013.

Mr. Koen Everaert suggested that activities need to be implemented under Outputs 2.1f and 2.1g and it is very unfortunate that there is no allocation for these activities. He thus suggested that these activities should be given priority.

Mr. Lun Kimhy mentioned that all the funds have been allocated and contracted to activities proposed by FA, FiA and GDANCP and thus it will be challenging to amend the proposed plan.

Mr. Tim Boyle added that there had been earlier work on these topics and work that has been undertaken at the regional level.

Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren mentioned the shortfall and operational costs and asked the board to suggest how to deal with the shortfall.

Mr. Koen Everaert mentioned that the size of the 2014 budget is very large and he is not worried that there will be shortfall at the end of 2014.

Mr. Kim Nong mentioned the need for doing activities on the ground to combat the degradation activities. This should be considered.

Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren suggested the PEB approve the work plan for the first four months and then address the budget again at the first meeting in 2014. She also asked for a presentation on substantial achievements at the first PEB meeting in 2014.

#### Decisions:

- The PEB requested the NPD to lead periodically on technical monitoring of progress based on agreed indicators at PEB Meeting.
- The PEB agreed that the technical teams should become operational by the end of 2013, and the PEB is looking forward to progress of the technical teams at the next PEB meeting, PEB 7<sup>th</sup>.

#### Comments and discussion

Mr. Thomas Enters suggested splitting the PEB meeting into an open and a closed part, where the open part will be for information sharing by stakeholders who have been working on REDD+ and the closed part reserved for PEB business. He also requested the RTS to draft an option paper on how to coordinate REDD+ activities in Cambodia and present it to the Taskforce to reflect and decide. He does not think that the PEB is the right place to coordinate REDD+ activities in Cambodia.

Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren mentioned the general need for a coordinating mechanism for all REDD+ activities in Cambodia.

**Mr. Koen Everaert** mentioned that there are other options to share information like the different Technical Working Groups. He suggested that all of the meetings should be open. He thus does not support the suggestion of having a closed meeting.

Mr. Chuop Paris agreed that the PEB is not the right place to coordinate REDD+ related activities and he also does not see any reason to expand the roles of the PEB. The PEB's role is only to provide direction for the Programme.

Mr. Ouk Vibol supported Mr. Paris' comments.

Ms. Setsuko Yamazaki suggested that there should be some kind of coordination and information sharing on REDD+ and suggested to have a government led initiative to have all the actors working on REDD+ to come and work together. She stressed that the UN-REDD Programme will only run for one more year and thus it is not the right place for this activity in a long-run. UN REDD however can support the government in establishing such a government-led forum during the remaining year, as required.

**H.E. Chheng Kimsun** agreed that the PEB should have open meetings, and if the board has sensitive issues to discuss then the board could have another closed meeting.

**Mr.** Nok Ven supported the idea of information sharing, especially on outcomes from the Consultation Group meeting.

**H.E. Chheng Kimsun** mentioned that the success of REDD+ programme in Cambodia depends on the strength of the Secretariat, vice versa. He also suggested that the Secretariat needs to present the information more effectively and not just provide the documents to the PEB members. He suggested that there should be a brief summary for each document.

#### Decisions:

- The PEB endorsed the work plan for 2014 provisionally for the first trimester (four months), and requested the NPD to explore additional sources of funding to fill the budget shortfall.
- The PEB decided that at the first meeting in 2014 an update on spending in the first quarter of 2014 and on expectations should be prepared and if there are still expectations of shortfalls then the Secretariat shall present an options paper for how to deal with this.

- The PEB would like to see section on creating greater synergies on strategies development under Outcome 2 reflected in the next work plan
- The PEB agreed that an open Board meeting will be piloted at the 8<sup>th</sup> PEB meeting (second PEB in 2014, date to be confirmed). An open Board meeting means that stakeholders working on REDD+ initiatives in Cambodia are invited to share information on their activities during the first part of the PEB meeting.
- The PEB agreed that the coordination mechanism for all REDD+ related initiatives in Cambodia should not be the PEB, but should be government led. Thus, the PEB recommended that the Secretariat prepare an options paper for presentation to the Taskforce to reflect and further decide on the format for such coordination mechanism

#### 4. Open Discussion

**Mr. Lun Kimhy** reported on the outcomes of the two Taskforce meetings highlighting the Taskforce's approval of ToR for the four technical teams, the updates on decisions adopted at COP19<sup>th</sup>, progress made on social and environmental safeguards preliminary review, work on national forest monitoring systems, and the approval on calendar of work.

**Mr. Nok Ven** reported on work done by the Consultation Group. He mentioned that the group had agreed on their internal rules, and have nominated members to join the technical teams. They had also received updates on decisions adopted at COP19<sup>th</sup>. Finally, he mentioned that the Consultation Group will have training for four days next week in Kampot.

Mr. Thomas Enters suggested that the minutes from Taskforce and Consultation Group meetings should be posted on the Cambodia REDD+ website.

Mr. Kim Narong explained that the Consultation Group does produce minutes and circulate to their constituencies.

Mr. Ouk Vibol suggested that since the Consultation Group's minutes are in Khmer, the minutes should be summarized the main points of the minutes into English and post them on the Secretariat's website.

Mr. Ouk Vibol also invited the REDD+ Secretariat to present at the FiA's Technical Working Group meeting to present the status and progress on REDD+ in Cambodia.

Mr. Thomas Enters was pleased to receive the documents for the PEB one week in advance. He encouraged PEB members to have a browse through the documents prior to PEB meeting and thus the Secretariat should have shorter power points presentations.

Mr. Nok Ven mentioned the need for capacity building for communities and IPs which the UN-REDD Programme should address.

Mr. Lun Kimhy clarified that there have been programs and future programs on capacity building that included the involvement of communities and IPs.

Ms. Setsuko Yamazaki informed the PEB on the work for signing the document for the FCPF projects and in particular on the grievance mechanism and the need for capacity building at the UNDP country office.

H.E. Chheng Kimsun mentioned that there are too many mistakes in the Khmer version of the newsletter. He suggested the communication officer to consult further with national native speakers. Finally, he mentioned that the RTS can also send him the draft newsletter for comments and corrections.

#### Summing up by Ms. Claire Van der Vaeren:

Ms. Van der Vaeren summarized the decisions reached during the meeting.

#### Introduction

The Cambodia UN-REDD Programme communications strategy was approved at PEB-4.

The **Goal** of the strategy is:

To enhance communication with different stakeholders to raise awareness and knowledge management on climate change and REDD+ issues in the country.

To achieve this Goal, the Strategy seeks to achieve three objectives.

- 1. To enhance understanding of climate change and REDD+ concepts, carbon financing and forest conservation among different stakeholders to increase their understanding of and participation in REDD+.
- 2. To enhance understanding of forest related policies and environmental issues among forest adjacent communities and other stakeholders in Cambodia.
- 3. To strengthen relationship and communication with the Cambodian news media to enhance wider coverage of climate change and REDD+.

Given the Goal and Objectives stated above, the following are the key outputs to be achieved through the Communications Strategy:

- Increased awareness and understanding of REDD+ and the National REDD+ Planning process in Cambodia amongst key stakeholders at national level and in particular within key government bodies
- A shared knowledge base amongst stakeholders and
- A strong working relationship and collaboration amongst academic institutions, communities, CSOs, donors, government institutions, IPs group, private sector, and all relevant stakeholders.

- Newsletter
- Programme leaflet
- Social media
- Fast-Facts/Event flyer
- Lessons Learned booklets

Database

#### Implementation to date

The following activities have been conducted and outputs secured since approval of the strategy:

#### Web-site

Cambodia-redd.org was launched on May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2013. Since that time it has been regularly updated and has received 489 visits.

#### **Newsletters**

Two editions of the Cambodia REDD+ Quarterly Newsletter have been produced, and the third edition is currently being compiled. 4,000 copies in Khmer and 1,000 copies in English are printed for each edition, and the newsletters are also posted on the web-site.

#### *Programme brochure*

A brochure describing the Cambodia REDD+ Programme has been produced in Khmer and English. 4,000 copies in Khmer and 1,000 copies in English have been printed.

#### Social media

A Cambodia REDD+ Programme Facebook page has been created, and news items are regularly posted. Currently, the page has received 420 "Likes", and is most popular among the 18-24 year age group.

#### Communications needs assessment

An on-line survey was conducted to allow staff of partner organizations to record their views on which communication materials are most important, across nine topics, for seven different audiences, and encompassing 5 types of communications materials. All existing materials were collected from partners, and used to identify gaps in communications materials (see below).

#### Awareness baseline assessment

A survey was designed and circulated at the beginning of the Consultation Group selection workshop in order to assess stakeholders' perceptions and actual knowledge of REDD+. The results have been drafted into a report.

#### Common communications materials

A multi-agency initiative is generating a common set of materials for awareness raising on REDD+ in Cambodia. A voluntary multi-stakeholder communications review committee has reviewed, or is currently reviewing 31 communications materials. Twelve reviews have been completed, with two products approved for general use, two for specific uses, three approved subject to amendments, 4 not approved, and one awaiting a decision.

#### Videos/posters

#### **UN-REDD Cambodia**

#### **Communications Strategy Update**

The RTS translated a video entitled "Introduction to REDD+", produced by the Global Canopy Programme, into Khmer, before the strategy was approved. This video has been widely utilized. However, based on experiences from the field and comments of the review committee, efforts are currently underway to revise and improve the video.

Leading efforts to fill the gaps identified through the communications needs assessment (above), the RTS has produced video scripts for 4 videos, targeting monks, local communities, IPs, government, CSOs/NGOs, and academia:

- Safeguards, including FPIC
- Incentives
- Co-benefits
- MRV

Two posters, on safeguards, including FPIC, and incentives, have also been drafted and are currently undergoing review.

#### Study tour

From October 30<sup>th</sup> to November 1<sup>st</sup>, three country delegations, from Myanmar, Sri Lanka, and Viet Nam, visited Cambodia to learn about experiences with stakeholder engagement and communications. All three delegations reported that they intended to replicate Cambodian communications initiatives to develop a REDD+ glossary, establish a multi-stakeholder review committee, and undertake an awareness baseline assessment. Materials related to each of these processes were subsequently shared with the delegations.

At the same time, the RTS hosted the UN-REDD/Papua New Guinea Communications Officer to gain knowledge from Cambodian experiences.

#### **Summary Progress and achievements in 2013**

This summary provides a brief overview of the achievements and progress by the UN-REDD Programme in 2013.

#### Outcome 1:

Output 1.1: The Taskforce has been formally established on 26 February 2013, eight months later than the original target. ToRs of Taskforce has been included in the Prakas (decision). The first and second Taskforce meetings were held and ToRs of four Technical Teams were approved in the first meeting. Mol, MIME and FiA have nominated technical staff to join the Technical Teams and nomination technical staff from FA, GDANCP, MRD, MEF and MLUMC is in process.

Output 1.2: The Taskforce Secretariat was established in July 2012, one month behind target. It has organised 15 RTS meetings and the fourth, fifth and sixth PEB meeting. New revised indicators for result framework have developed and approved. Technical government officers were supported to attend regional workshops and key officers were supported to attend Policy Board meeting, SBSTA38<sup>th</sup> and COP19<sup>th</sup>. To tackle problems on decision and management arrangement, a mid-term review took place in May. Following on this MoE formed Protected Areas – REDD team (PA-REDD) in order to reposition REDD+ team from MoE and, a UN-REDD SOP was approved and applied with record keeping the compliance.

Outputs 1.3: Self-selection processes to form the Cambodia REDD+ Consultation Group (CG) was conducted. The CG was formed in a national workshop with eighteen members from nine stakeholder groups. Follow forming CG organised 3 meetings to develop ToR/Internal Rules and nominate third-teen members to join the four REDD+ Technical Teams. A study tour on Stakeholder Engagement and Communication was organised for three days from 30 Oct to 1 Nov for delegations from Myanmar, Vietnam, Srei Lanka, Nepal, Pakistan PNG and UN-REDD regional.

Outputs 1.4: The Cambodia REDD+ Website was launched in May and REDD+ information is being access. Communication team meetings were organised to collect and review REDD+ information materials and REDD+ glossaries have been drafted. The 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Cambodia REDD+ newsletters were published and circulated to target audiences. REDD+ Photo Contest and Concert will be held on 14 December. Curriculum and materials for REDD+ Awareness Raising training were developed and the first awareness training at national level will be held from 16 to 19 December.

#### Outcome 2:

Output 2.1: As part of capacity building and training to ministries (Act: 2.1a) a full day seminar on international negotiations under the UNFCCC was organized for key government officials and NGOs involved in REDD+ took place in Phnom Penh on 23 May and a second full day seminar is being planned for 19<sup>th</sup> December. The Cambodia R-PP(FCPF REDD+ Readiness project) was finalized and waiting for signature (Act: 2.1b). In order to support implementing agencies to development of individual REDD+ strategies and implementation modalities (Act: 2.1c, 2.1d, 2.1e) funding agreements were made with FA, GDANCP and FiA as reference to the approved concepts notes. Advances have been released to FiA and FA for launching project and implementing their project activities. Procurement process for national and international consultants for FA are finalized while GDANCP are in process.

Output 2.2: UNEP's Small Scale Funding Agreement (SSFA)was signed on 20 July. The concepts note for activity 2.2a (1: Workshop on valuation of standing forests in Cambodia and 2: Valuation of multiple

benefits of standing forests under the management strategies) and ToRs for consultant were developed and approved. Procurement process for national consultant to organize the workshop (first activity) is in process. Concept notes and Tor for activity 2.2b (Scoping and evaluation of REDD+ activities) has been developed and Concept notes and Tor for activity 2.2c (Economic assessment of the potential local costs and benefits of implementing REDD+ activities in Cambodia) has also been developed.

Outputs 2.3 and 2.4: The two outputs were combined during the Inception Workshop and approved by PEB2. The concepts note and ToRs of consultants for the activity 2.3b (Assessment of existing benefit sharing models used in Cambodia and other parts of the world relevant for REDD+ in Cambodia) 2.3c (Consultation on results from the assessment) and 2.3d (Development of preferred options for benefit sharing) has been developed and approved and international and national consultants have been hired and work plan for the assignment has been submitted. Concept note and ToR for an assessment of existing fund mechanisms under Cambodian Law (Act: 2.3e) has developed and approved and international consultant has been hired and the work plan have been submitted for approval.

Output 2.5: This output was dropped as a result of a decision at PEB 4, but one significant result was achieved before it was dropped, namely an assessment of options for establishment of a REDD+ grievance mechanism.

Output 2.6: Technical assistance for this output has been supported by the experiences UNDP programme analyst and Cam-REDD officer. The concepts notes for activity 2.6b (Initial assessment of REDD+ safeguards at project and national level compared with existing frameworks for socio-economic and environmental safeguards and monitoring in Cambodia) and activity 2.6d (Development of a proposed approach to safeguards) were developed and approved. Development of safeguard technical paper has been progressed on UNFCCC safeguards principles and comparison of global safeguards (UN-REDD, WB, CCBA and CI). For next part of this paper like is in progress. The target delivery of this paper is 28 February 2014.

#### Outcome 3:

Output 3.1: Although the REDD+ projects and subnational approach Technical Team has not yet been formed due the delay in establishment of the TF, priority areas have been identified and processes for scaling up from project to sub-national approach initiated.

Output 3.2: Support to REDD+ pilot projects was achieved. Sales of carbon credits have not yet occurred for a variety of reasons.

#### Outcome 4

Output 4.1: The ToR for the MRV Technical team has been approved in the first taskforce meeting. Mol, MIME and FiA have nominated technical staff to join the MRV Technical Team and nomination of technical staff from FA, GDANCP, MRD, MEF and MLUMC is in process. Development of a joint training programme with JICA has been prepared; and design of national forest inventory will be ready by End of December.

Output 4.2: Progress has been made to develop Cambodia Monitoring system. A report on the existing national and subnational classification is available. A consultant has been hired to harmonize current legends for comparison and advice. Discussions were initiated but national forest definition, land classification system and carbon pools to be considered are not defined yet due to the delay in operationalizing the technical team.

Output 4.3: Substantial progress has been made to design the satellite forest monitoring system. Training on forest monitoring system by INPE, Brazil has been completed, and a national consultation has been undertaken. The report on inventory of existing satellite and aerial imageries is under final revision. Available Remote sensing and GIS data has been compiled, and a test version of satellite forest monitoring system web platform has been developed.

Output 4.4: Substantial progress has been made to design the National Forest Inventory (NFI) to develop emission and removal factors for REDD+ related activities. Report and database existing allometric equations are available. Accessible forest inventory data have been stored in the REDD+ secretariat, analysis is ongoing. NFI Design will be presented 1<sup>st</sup> half of December 2013, and targeted delivery of the NFI field manual is End of February 2014.

Output 4.5: There has been moderate progress towards indicators in the results framework; a training workshop on GHG Inventory was conducted. Recommendations are provided to establish adequate institutional arrangements and data sharing agreements required for implementation of the GHG reporting system.

Output 4.6: There has been little progress towards indicators in the results framework, although key drivers of deforestation have been indicated, TORs have been developed and data of existing REDD+ initiatives has been collected to develop the National RL/REL framework.

# Concept note for how the PEB can serve as the body for information sharing for all REDD+ activities in Cambodia

#### **Background**

Cambodia have been involved in REDD since REDD+ came on the international agenda as a promising way to reduce emissions from deforestation and forest degradation and establishment of new forests and are today participating in a number of REDD+ programmes and host to a number of REDD+ pilot projects.

This has increased the need for looking for more efficient ways to coordinate and govern all these activities. The Policy Executive Board for the UN-REDD Programme decided therefore at its fifth PEB meeting to invite the National Programme Director to present a concept note at the sixth PEB meeting for how the PEB can be the governing body for REDD+ activities in Cambodia. At the same meeting the PEB decided that it will also be the PEB for the Forest Carbon Partnership Facility Project which is about to be implemented in Cambodia and which will run until the end of 2016.

The PEB will normally have three meetings per year.

#### Suggested scope

During the development of this concept note it was found that PEB as governing body for all REDD+ in Cambodia would overlap with the mandate of the REDD+ Taskforce as the supreme governing body of REDD+ in Cambodia. At the same time it was found that since many REDD+ related activities are carried out by different organizations including NGOs that the Taskforce as a pure government body would not be able to both function as the governing body and as the place for information sharing in regard to REDD+ activities in Cambodia.

The PEB with representatives and observers from a number of supporting frameworks and organizations involved in REDD+ activities in Cambodia could better fulfill the role as a place for information sharing on REDD+ activities in Cambodia.

The secretariat functions as the secretariat for the REDD+ Taskforce and at the same time as secretariat for the PEB provide it with a unique role for securing the information flow from the PEB information sharing on REDD+ to the REDD+ Taskforce as the decision making body.

With the expanded role as a place for information sharing the PEB should involve more observers involved in REDD+ in Cambodia as appropriate. This could be decided on an ad hoc basic by the PEB co-chairs after suggestion by the secretariat depending on which organizations and initiatives are active on REDD+ in Cambodia.

#### Action

The PEB agenda will for future meetings include an agenda item: Update on REDD+

The secretariat will encourage NGOs and government line agencies to share information related to REDD+.

#### Follow up on PEB5 decision

The PEB is invited to consider the following two options to the request made at PEB5 to the RTS to present a proposal to the next meeting of the PEB, proposing when and how a technical review of progress against indicators would be undertaken.

**Background:** The indicators were revised following recommendations made by the mid-term review and decision by the PEB5. The UN-REDD programme will run until the end of 2014.

#### Option 1:

The NPD will at each PEB meeting during 2014 report on the status of indicators which should have been achieved by the time of the meeting as well as indicators which should be meet during the following four months.
