
The overall framework for FAO's work in tenure



Voluntary Guidelines on the Responsible Governance of Tenure of Land, Fisheries and Forests in the Context of National Food Security

Principles and internationally accepted practices to guide the preparation and implementation of policies, laws and actions related to tenure governance:

- ➤ Negotiated by member countries.
- ➤To be endorsed by Committee on Food Security on 11 May 2012.
- ➤ Partnerships for implementation.

 - Physical and economic access to food






- Coordinate a global approach to food security

Part 4: Transfers and other changes to tenure rights and duties

Part 7: Promotion, implementation, monitoring and evaluation

A recognition of general principles:

- Recognize and respect legitimate holders of tenure rights, and their rights.
- Safeguard legitimate tenure rights against threats.
- Promote and facilitate the enjoyment of legitimate tenure rights.
- **Provide** access to justice to deal with infringements.
- **Prevent** tenure disputes, violent conflicts, and opportunities for corruption.

Voluntary Guidelines on Governance of Tenure 'Green growth'



The Negotiated Draft

- Is pro-poor and pro-gender equality and includes important provisions supporting these principles.
- Comprehensively addresses tenure aspects that involve indigenous peoples and other communities with customary tenure systems
- Adopts the principle of 'holistic and sustainable approach'.
- Addresses the consideration of climate change adaptation and mitigation in the application of tenure rights
