Shaping the Strategic Vision

major efforts to engage cross-sectoral actors



but REDD+ and national devt planning & budgeting timeframes differ

long-term vision integrates with other national policies and sectors

implementation framework based on Constitutional rights and wellbeing



Discussion Group #1: How to engage non-forest sectors?

 lead agency develops draft vision that can be shared and shaped to others' interests

use champions at (sub) national level

but be aware of the risks of using political "players"

 use data to engage, but resolve any potential conflicts over the source and figures <u>before</u> political engagement



Discussion Group #2: How to harmonise/integrate REDD+?

- political decisions need political leadership
- good communication is key (package REDD+ meaningfully, don't use too much in-house jargon)
- before aligning, first of all find out what other sectors do, align with planning cycles
- integrate with big picture and start
 with the easy stuff don't get diverted
- make REDD+ an opportunity not a threat

Discussion Group #3: How to gain high-level political support?

- demonstrate business case and show the development/economic gains and costs avoided from pursuing REDD+ actions
- target your lobbying and make sure you push the right buttons (e.g. international commitments, political mandates, etc.)
- build consensus among political parties, build regional alliances – overcome individual and partisan interests




Discussion group #4: What financing strategy for REDD+?

- need to think carefully what REDD+ will cost (both direct RBP & supportive actions)
 - APs also need a budget
- financing review should be a key part of NS/AP development: existing finance, potential for leveraging finance, needs to generate new and additional funds, mechanisms for doing this
- as well as tapping into or reorienting what's already there, may need new mechanisms (e.g. trust fund, fiscal transfers, new revenues)
- not just national-level activity: also need to
 leverage international spending

improving understanding of emissions from fire & its dynamics


monitoring small deforestation increments
