# Common framework of pillars and principles of good governance



### Usefulness of Framework for REDD+

- REDD+ guidance: types of information to be provided under each pillar
- Framework: range of parameters to choose from for forest governance assessment or monitoring and guidance for their use

### Example 2

#### Forest governance

#### Legal framework to support and protect land tenure, ownership and use rights

Extent to which the legal framework recognizes and protects forest-related property rights, including rights to carbon
Extent to which the legal framework recognizes customary and traditional rights of indigenous peoples, local communities and traditional forest users
Consistency between formal and informal rights to forest resources
Extent to which the legal framework provides effective means of resolving disputes by due process

#### REDD+ governance

Existence of legal framework supporting and protecting land tenure, carbon ownership and use rights, including customary and traditional rights of indigenous peoples and local communities
