## 2. Executive Summary

The activities of the Global Programme support the country efforts on REDD+. They also seek to support the international community at large in building confidence and understanding of the policy and technical aspects of the eventual REDD+ mechanism under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). The Global Programme activities focus on providing practical guidance on REDD+, convening technical meetings at regional and international levels, providing data, carrying out and sharing analyses, improving knowledge and awareness of REDD+ opportunities and challenges, and enhancing collaboration among the UN agencies and with other initiatives.

The programme design draws from the respective strengths of the partner agencies in line with One-UN objectives and provides technical and scientific support as well as knowledge management. The original Global programme Document is available at:

At its first meeting (9-10 March 2009, Panama), the UN-REDD Policy Board approved the budget allocations for the Global Programme, amounting to US\$ 6,673,590.

At its second meeting (14-15 June, Montreux), the UN-REDD Policy Board approved the budget allocations to revise the Global Programme, with an amount of US\$ 2,888,415, to incorporate the establishment and operation of the Programme Secretariat and include funds for regional technical support. As with the first budget revision, <u>the overall formulation of the programme under this revision remains the same as per the first Global Joint Programme document</u> signed by FAO, UNDP and UNEP and presented at the first Policy Board Meeting of the UN-REDD Programme (9-10 March 2009, Panama). <sup>1</sup>

This time, the budget is revised by an amount of US\$ 3,763,577 to increase the activities to achieve three of the four outcomes that have been set, namely:

Outcome 1: Improved guidance on Measurement, Reporting and Verification (MRV) approaches

Outcome 2: Increased engagement of stakeholders in the REDD agenda

**Outcome 4**: Increased knowledge management, coordination and communication (specifically output 4.4 related to operation of the UN-REDD Programme Secretariat)

The main reasons for strengthening these activities is the increased demand from the UN-REDD Programme and other countries for support to testing, developing and implementing MRV methodologies and setting up national MRV systems, as well as an increasing need to promote stakeholder awareness and engagement in REDD+ activities.

## 3. Results Framework, work plans and budgets

#### 3.1 Budget Revision

The revision is made at the activity level. No changes are made at the outcome or output levels. The total amount of the revision for **six months** is US\$ 3,763,577, to be implemented within nine months period starting on 1 April 2010 to 31 December 2010. Implementation of the new activities under Outcomes 1 (MRV) and 2 (stakeholder engagement) are expected to start immediately. The budget for the UN-REDD

programme secretariat is for the period from 1 July to 31 December. *See Table 1: Results Framework and Resource Allocation*.

### 3.2. Summary of additional activities

As described in the Programme Framework Document of 20 June 2008 (<a href="http://www.undp.org/mdtf/UN-REDD/docs/Annex-A-Framework-Document.pdf">http://www.undp.org/mdtf/UN-REDD/docs/Annex-A-Framework-Document.pdf</a>), the three UN agencies — coordinating with other partners — can support the country actions in a variety of ways. Such efforts will be designed to maximize country benefits in the delivery of REDD and to ensure consistency in approaches and economies of scale.

The new activities can be summarized as follows.

<u>Outcome 1</u>: To further support the development of guidance on Measurement, Reporting and Verification (MRV) approaches, the UN-REDD programme will

- Review of the current status of REDD+ monitoring activities in countries in order to enhance and support national coordination on MRV. This will include an analysis of the relationship at both global and national levels between (a) monitoring of co-benefits and (b) greenhouse gases
- Support to organize in-country technical MRV workshops to ensure that capacity building plans to respond to MRV requirement for REDD+
- Provide further technical support to design and development of national monitoring systems and reference emissions levels (RELs) necessary for REDD+ readiness
- Increase capacity of national focal points to better understand and implement IPCC guidelines including by training of national experts to help them join the UNFCCC roster of experts
- Develop MRV Guidelines, specifically a concrete action guide for implementation of a MRV system at country level and
- Identification of lessons from country experiences of developing MRV systems for the development of global guidance.

<u>Outcome 2:</u> To further support the engagement and participation of Indigenous Peoples' (IP) and Civil Society Organizations' (CSO) representatives in the REDD+ activities, the UN-REDD Programme will:

- Finalize the UN-REDD Guidelines on the Engagement of Indigenous Peoples and support their application in countries
   Support the participation of IP and CSO representatives in the UN-REDD Programme meetings and in other important global and regional meetings dealing with participation issues
- Support the UN-REDD programme countries to implement a recourse mechanism
- Facilitate IP & CSO engagement in the formulation and implementation of National Programmes through guidance, contacts with IP & CSO networks, follow up on consultation processes and distribution of consultation reports
- Facilitate targeted communication
- Provide national and regional training and capacity building on REDD for Indigenous Peoples and Civil Society Organizations
- Map out research already undertaken or available (incl. ongoing initiatives) to inform policy guidance
  and compile it online and identify needs to undertake research in order to formulate policy guidance
  on land and resource rights, REDD payment structuring, and role of IP and local communities and
  traditional knowledge in MRV.

In many of these activities under Outcome 2, a close link will be established with the IUCN "Towards Propoor REDD" project.

<u>Outcome 4</u>: Increased knowledge management, coordination and communication. This is largely done through a fully operational UN-REDD Programme Secretariat (output 4.4.) with the following main activities:

 Organize Policy Board meetings (including providing travel support to member participants from developing countries)

- Develop the UN-REDD programme further by increasing the number of countries and seeking additional funding to support their capacity development toward REDD+
- Monitor and evaluate the UN-REDD Programme, including:
  - Quality assurance and oversight of national joint programmes (support to development and implementation of national programmes)
  - Quality assurance and oversight of the international support functions (support to delivery of global activities to ensure coherence)
  - Plan and carry out an evaluation of the UN-REDD Programme
- Provide leadership in strategic planning
- Build partnerships and maintain external relations enhance collaboration
- Support the participating agencies to coordinate their efforts to increase synergies and efficiency and strengthen joint programming
- Enhance and apply innovative knowledge management, including by maintaining the UN-REDD
  website as well as the community of practice on the interactive Workspace, which all participating
  countries and partner initiatives can benefit from and contribute to
- Share information and lessons learned from country and agency efforts; and communicate on all aspects of REDD+.

Note: This budget revision UN-REDD Programme Secretariat enables its operation until end of 2010. The Secretariat plans to request a new budget for 2011 in the last quarter of 2010 (5<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Policy Board).

#### 3.3. Results framework, work plan and budget

The following tables describe the results framework, budget allocations and work plan (table 1) and a summary of the costs (table 2) for the additional activities:

The work plan and budget of this Programme has been developed jointly by the three participating UN organizations. It details the activities under the existing outcomes 1, 2 and 4 to be carried out within the UN-REDD programme, timeframes and planned inputs from the participating UN organizations as well as expected outcomes and outputs.

As necessary, a revised work plan and budget will be produced subsequent to the decisions of the annual/regular reviews.
