




Institutions

1.Identification

Policies, laws and regulations (PLRs), either existing or those created for REDD+



2. Safeguard Information System (SIS):

Existing or new indicators, methodologies for collecting information, and framework for provision of information

- Welcomed as a guiding framework by the eighth UN-REDD Programme Policy Board Meeting in Paraguay, in March 2012.
- Objectives:
 - To address social and environmental issues in UN-REDD National Programmes and other UN-REDD Programme funded activities.
 - To support countries in developing their national approaches to REDD+ safeguards in line with the UNFCCC.



Social and Environmental Principles and Criteria (SEPC)







The SEPC provides a guiding framework to help support countries in developing their approaches to safeguards:

- provides more detailed criteria that can be used to "unpack" the UNFCCC safeguards
- particularly useful at the stage of a country defining the objectives of its approach to safeguards



Social and Environmental Principles







REDD+ should...

- 1. Apply norms of **democratic governance**, as reflected in national commitments and Multilateral Agreements
- Respect and protect stakeholder rights in accordance with international obligations
- 3. Promote sustainable livelihoods and poverty reduction
- 4. Contribute to **low-carbon**, **climate-resilient sustainable development policy**, consistent with national development strategies, national forest programmes, and commitments under international conventions and agreements
- 5. Protect natural forest from degradation and/or conversion
- Maintain and enhance multiple functions of forest including conservation of biodiversity and provision of ecosystem services
- 7. Avoid or minimize **adverse impacts** on non-forest ecosystem services and biodiversity



Principle 6 — Maintain and enhance

multiple functions of forest including conservation of biodiversity and provision of ecosystem services

Criterion 21 – Ensure that land-use planning for REDD+ explicitly takes account of potential synergies and trade-offs between the multiple functions of forest and the benefits they provide, respecting local and other stakeholders' values

Criterion 22 – Ensure that planted and natural forests are managed to maintain and enhance ecosystem services and biodiversity important in both local and national contexts
